

You will learn more about the history of Québec, while exploring its brilliant defence system. For more information, consult the guide on page 10.

Visit the nearby Artillery Park Heritage Site of Canada and enjoy its costumed interpretation program and historic buildings. For more information, consult the guide on page 8.

In Old Québec, near the funicular and under the Dufferin Terrace.

For over 200 years, under both the French and the British rule, the Saint-Louis forts and châteaux served as official residences and the seat of power for the majority of the governors.

After the 17th century, many forts and châteaux occupied the site, which dominates Québec's Lower Town and the St. Lawrence River. Only the remains of the structures exist today, but they were once an integral part of the city's defence system. From Samuel de Champlain's reign until the château burned down in 1834, the location was used as a genuine colonial court, at the heart of the colony's political, cultural and social life.

To celebrate the 400th anniversary of the founding of Québec City, in 2008 the site will be accessible to visitors.





Enjoy Your Visit to the Fullest

From July 14 to October 12. 2008, the Institut Canadien de Québec, in partnership with the Archives et le Service de la Culture de la Ville de Québec, will present the exhibit Scores of Archives in the building that houses the Arsenal Foundry of Artillery Park. Under the theme of The Encounter, the exhibit is an opportunity to show the rich heritage and collections of the Archives de la Ville de Québec. The exhibit is free, though entrance fees will be required for access to the other rooms and buildings in the historic site.

At the corner of Rue Saint-Jean and Rue D'Auteuil in Old Québec

An important barracks and military storage site built in the colonial era, Artillery Park was an integral part of the defensive works surrounding Québec, a city strategically established on the edge of the river. Visit three historic buildings featuring unique architecture: the Dauphine Redoubt (1712), the Officers' Quarters (1818), and the Arsenal Foundry (1903). Take a visual ramble through the city of yesteryear and view By and Duberger's impressive scale model built in 1808.



COSTUMED INTERPRETA-TION AND FLINTLOCK MUSKET SHOOTING

From July 2 to August 24, see soldiers from the Compagnies Franches de la Marine perform musket practice using real black powder. The soldiers can also describe the 250 years of the site's occupation when they accompany you on guided tours.

You will have the chance to meet a cook making a soup, a servant passing around bread in the officers' mess kitchen, a British officer or his wife welcoming you into the Officers' Quarters, and a soldier from the Compagnies Franches de la Marine "at home" in a barrack-room—these colonial-era characters who once lived on the site have a lot to show you. Don't miss these unusual encounters!

You can also visit the site using an audioguide.

STROKES OF MILITARY GENIUS!

The scale model of Québec celebrates its 200th anniversary in 2008. Made to the 1/300 scale, this military work was built to convince the British colonial authorities of the necessity of improving Québec's defence system. The model illustrates the city and its topography, main roads, buildings and defensive works.

Visitors are welcomed by a military engineer from the old days and they learn about his manufacturing process. They are introduced to the mathematical and scientific theories of the time, and to the surveyor, cartographer and draughtsman tools. They also get involved in a manufacturing workshop.

Fortifications Interpretation Centre: 100 Saint-Louis Street, at the foot of Côte de la Citadelle, near the Saint-Louis Gate in Old Québec.

A gated rampart and numerous remains of military structures: you are now in the heart of the city of Québec, colonial Canada's first fortified site. The fortifications bear witness to the evolution of Québec's defence works from the 17th to the 19th century. Today, Québec is the only fortified city in North America. Moreover, in 1985 the Historic District of Old Québec earned a place on UNESCO's list of world heritage sites. Walk along the 4.6 kilometres of fortifications surrounding Old Québec.

You'll learn how European defence principles were adapted and why the walls have their particular shape. You'll also enjoy unrivalled views of the city and its vicinity. In Québec's Lower Town, at 175 De l'Espinay Street, 10 minutes from Old Québec.

In 1535-1536, Jacques Cartier crossed the Atlantic for the second time. Under harsh conditions, he and his crew spent a tough winter on the banks of the Saint-Charles River on the site of the present-day Cartier-Brébeuf National Historic Site. Later, the Jesuits settled on the same location. Relive the voyages of the famous explorer and his encounter with the St. Lawrence Iroquoians. Mingle with the missionaries who came to educate and evangelize the Aboriginal people in 1625.



Explore the 14-km-long Lachine Canal multi-purpose path. Bikes and in-line skates can be rented nearby.

Visit the Visitor Service Centre at the Lachine lock and view two exhibits on the history of the Lachine Canal.

Enjoy any one of the many activities offered by the Pôle des Rapides tourism sector, such as cycling and visiting area museums, including the Lachine Museum.

Don't miss the nearby **Outdoor Sculpture Museum** in René Lévesque Park, the largest outdoor sculpture park in Eastern Canada.

In the Borough of Lachine, accessible via Highway 20 West, 20 minutes from downtown Montréal.

At The Fur Trade at Lachine, you will learn about one of the most important periods in the Canadian history. Relive the adventures of aboriginal trappers, French-Canadian voyageurs, and European merchants of the fur trade era.

SPOTLIGHT ON FUR

(guided group visit)

Several themes are explored at this former hub of the fur trade: the daily life of the voyageurs, the lively competition between the North West Company and the Hudson's Bay Company, the felt hat fashion, and more. Discover the workings of the trade, which was the driving force of Canada's economy for two centuries.



Explore the 14-km path along the canal on foot, on in-line skates, or on a bike. Sports equipment can be rented near the site.

- Cruise the canal and discover its five locks! Small boats can be rented on site.
- Visit the Lachine Lockstation and its Visitor Service Centre where you will find interpretive displays, exhibits on the history of the canal, and a lookout terrace.
- Visit the Saint-Gabriel House, the Lachine Museum and the many other attractions in the Pôle des Rapides tourism sector. Don't forget the Atwater Market, a hub of urban activity.
- Visit the historic neighbourhoods in southwestern Montréal.

Accessible from Montréal's Old Port, from Old Lachine and from the Atwater Market.

Gently steer your boat up or down the canal or travel along the area surrounding this imposing feat of engineering built to bypass the Lachine Rapids. Opened in 1825 and widened twice since, the canal was closed to navigation in 1970. Since May 2002, boaters have been able to return to the calm man-made waterway, thanks to a major revitalization project. Discover this unique site, the cradle of Montréal's industrialization.



25 km west of Montréal via Highway 20 or 40. The canal links Lac Saint-Louis and Lac des Deux-Montagnes.

Water-the ultimate mode of transportation! In Sainte-Anne-de-Bellevue, the canal was a major "jumping off" or transfer point, not only for immigrants travelling to the interior of the country, but also for wood being shipped downriver. Used for commercial purposes from the time of its opening in 1843, the canal was subsequently integrated into the Montréal-Ottawa-Kingston inland waterway. Today, throngs of boaters travel up and down the corridor. Come see them pass by and discover the history of this one-of-a-kind site.

A TOUR OF THE ISLAND

Like the immigrants who came here before you, begin your tour by entering the Disinfection Building and meeting the staff of the quarantine station. Next, visit the multimedia exhibit that narrates the history of the site. Set out on one of the maintained trails to see the Celtic Cross, the western cemetery, and the Memorial. Take the trolley to the centre of the island, where the quarantine station's employees once lived. The tour continues to the eastern end of the site in what is known as the hospital sector. The Lazaretto, the oldest building on Grosse Île, is located there and bears witness to the tragic events of 1847.

Camping

Hiking Trails

The best way to discover Forillon is by taking one of the nine trails crisscrossing the park. From the top of the Mt. Saint-Alban observation tower, at 283 metres in altitude, gaze out over breathtaking mountain and ocean vistas. Follow Graves trail to where the Appalachians meet the sea. Explore the International Appalachian Trail (IAT), which crosses the park from west to east for approximately 50 km.


ADDITIONAL ACTIVITIES

Canoe-Camping

Paddle across tranquil lakes and portage over the same trails once used by Aboriginal people and the coureurs de bois. You'll be carried away by the magic of the Laurentians.

Camping

Settle into one of the park's three designated campgrounds, all located in wooded areas. The Rivière-à-la-Pêche campground has sites with electricity. You should reserve your site as early as possible, starting in the spring.

Whether you're a beginner, intermediate, or expert skier, enjoy the 80-km network of marked and groomed trails. There are heated shelters every 5 km. Glide through winter!

Take advantage of cozy, comfortable lodging year round. Stay at the Wabenaki and Andrew lodges and relive the glory years of the fish and game clubs. These heritage buildings are located at the heart of a vast network of trails and lakes.


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
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
