
WELCOME

Through their strong relationship with Creator, Ancestors and Mother Earth, the Anishinaabeg ensure their physical, spiritual, and cultural survival. The Anishinaabeg share their invaluable knowledge, technologies, and skills and exchange furs and other natural material goods for European goods to ensure their European partners' survival and the success of the North West Company. Each summer, French-Canadian voyageurs, Scottish businessmen, Indigenous Peoples, and others from around the world gather at Fort William for the Great Rendezvous to discuss business, share news and renew friendships. Experience this unique place and time in Canadian history through the eyes of peoples past.


