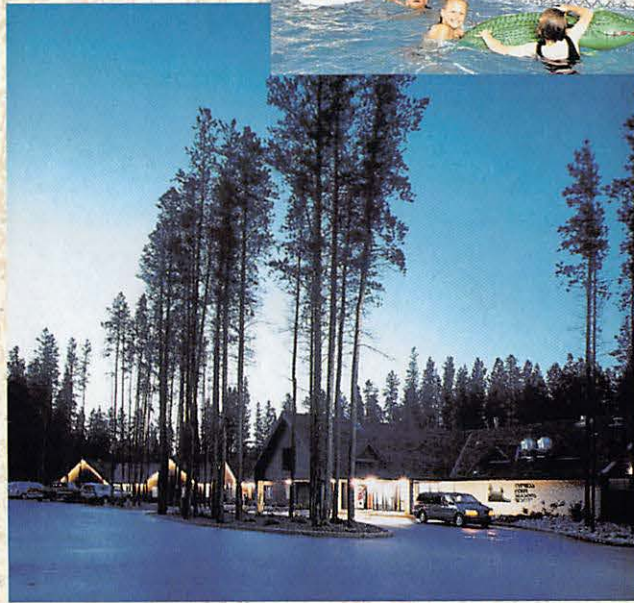


For Business or Pleasure

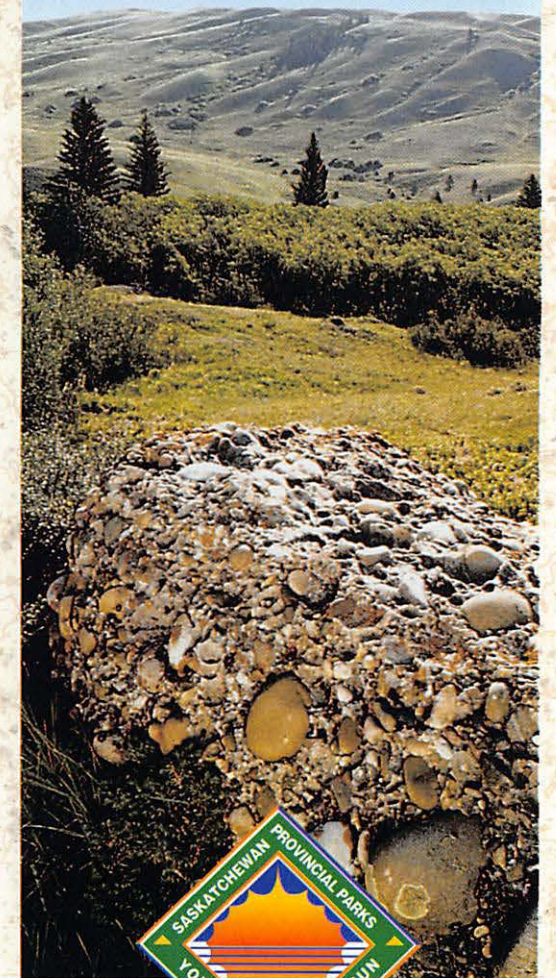

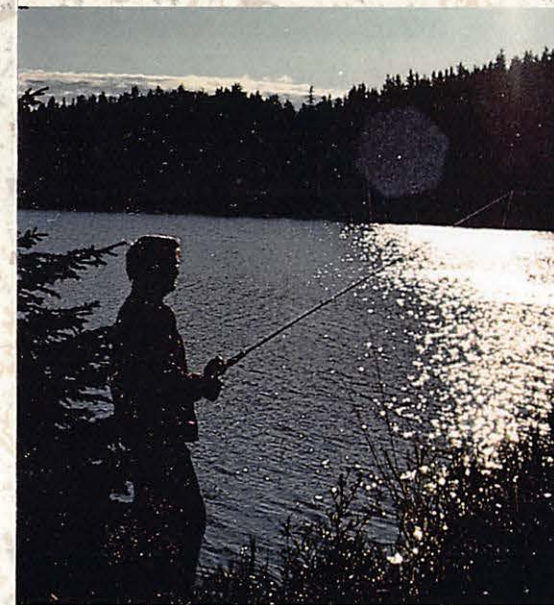

Where once a mighty plateau existed, now remains a lush forest—an oasis in the midst of Saskatchewan's open plains. This forest, made of lodgepole pines (unique to Saskatchewan) stands in the majestic southwest; it's the highest elevation between Labrador and the Rockies. It's Cypress Hills; Canada's first interprovincial park—straddling the Saskatchewan/Alberta border.



Once a giant glacier and plateau, Cypress Hills has escaped the erosion of time. First called the 'beautiful highlands' by the Cree, French Canadian fur traders named the area "Cypres" in the early 1800s.

They mistook the lodgepole pines for the cypres or jack pine of eastern Canada. Enjoy a world of high forested hills, panoramic views, quiet valleys and cool clean air... in Cypress Hills Provincial Park.



The Four Seasons of Cypress Hills...

The sight of Cypress Hills in this prairie province is especially delightful in spring and fall. The colors of the natural vegetation come alive in these seasons. Camping at this time is tranquil and breathtaking. The Cypress Hills Four Seasons Resort offers year-round accommodation in hotel rooms, condominiums and cabins. An indoor pool, hot tub, licensed dining room and lounge add luxury to the outdoor activities available to you. Tennis courts, outdoor swimming pool, hiking trails, a ball diamond, picnic grounds and trail rides are just the beginning. Loch Leven is conveniently situated in the core of the park and offers various water recreation opportunities. The many interpretive and recreational activities available to you will make your stay at Cypress Hills Provincial Park pleasantly unforgettable.



'Nature' is the perfect word to describe the outdoor experience in Cypress Hills. Over 200 species of birds can be seen, some of which are usually found only in northern forests and the Rockies. Wild flowers bloom in various colors and pronghorn antelope run across the grasslands. In the prairie or forest, you may spot elk, moose, white-tailed deer, mule deer, bobcat, coyote and red fox. The trumpeter swan, great blue heron and a collection of waterfowl can also be found in the wetlands.
