Hello and welcome to Fundy National Park! Since 1948 this place has been protected by Parks Canada for the benefit and enjoyment of all Canadians. Many have formed and continue to form lasting memories here.

I am one of the privileged few to live in a national park, and every day I get to enjoy my morning coffee as I watch the sun rise over the Bay of Fundy. As the sunlight floods my kitchen, I feel convinced that I have found the perfect light of solitude. From where I sit, I see Fundy National Park centred in a magnificent landscape; Cape Enrage is in the distance and if I let my mind travel further up the Bay, I imagine Hopewell Rocks as a sentinel at the mouth of the Peticodiac River. Looking westward, just past the last headland in the distance, I can picture the Fundy Trail Parkway winding its way through the wilderness beyond the Park's boundary.

What a place this is: New Brunswick's Fundy Coast! Along this coastline you will discover a landscape and a culture shaped by the tides of the bay. Arriving in Fundy National Park's gateway community, Alma, you'll witness fishermen landing the catch of the day: famous Bay of Fundy lobsters and scallops!

One of my favourite experiences in the park is to walk through the majestic red spruce forest along the way to Point Wolfe beach. As the sunlight filters through the 400 year old canopy it seems to carry a message with it; slowing the pace of everyday life and bringing us back to a simpler time. While walking through these trees, I try to imagine what life must have been like for the early settlers, how their days were often governed by the rhythm of the tides, and how they helped shape the remarkable landscape we know and enjoy. Fundy National Park holds the key to endless moments of discovery and opportunities for introspection. Whether it's sunrises, sunsets, forests, trails or beaches, Fundy offers infinite opportunities to explore and to lose yourself in the wonders of nature. No two experiences are the same...what will yours be?

Foster Book is nestled in a river valley. This site is surrounded by the cool, clear waters of Point Wolfe

Marven-Chambers has quiet lakeside campsites, hidden in the Caledonia Highlands!

Tracey Lake Enjoy camping under the stars. These sites are a short hike from Bennett Lake.

Group Camping

Four group campsites for tent camping are available to organized groups. Sites can accommodate 20 to 50 people and share a single service building containing washrooms and kitchen shelter. There is one fire pit on each of the four sites. Reservations are required and can be made by calling (506) 887-6000.

Front country Camping

Fundy National Park has three front country campgrounds, each providing a unique camping experience. You will find amenities such as washrooms, showers, laundry facilities, electrical, sewer and water hookups all within close proximity to other Park services and facilities. Take a closer look at our front country offer and decide which site is just right for you!

Chignecto North Campground This campground offers serviced and unserviced sites with campfire pits. This campground is a great place for families looking for active, outdoor adventure as it is close to hiking trails, playgrounds, the group campfire circle and our dark sky viewing area.

Headquarters Campground Headquarters is for those looking for camping made easy! It offers great view of the Bay of Fundy, access to all of the services and facilities in the headquarters area including our new playground and is situated within walking distance of the Village of Alma.

Point Wolfe Campground Get just far enough away to escape! This campground provides a simplified front country camping experience with unserviced sites and firepits; Point Wolfe is in the heart of some of Fundy's most spectacular coastal wilderness.


Alcohol

Fishing

Fishing is permitted only in Bennett Lake (brook trout). A national park fishing permit is required and can be obtained at Bennett Lake or at the Visitor Reception Centre.

Geocaching

Join us for a treasure hunt! The goal of Geocaching is to find hidden containers known as caches or geocaches using a portable satellite navigation device called a Global Positioning System (GPS) receiver. To uncover Fundy's geocaches find the coordinates at www.geocaching.com. If you do not own a GPS device, the Fundy Guild rents GPS units at their boutique located at the Visitor Reception Centre.

Picnic in the Park

Enjoy a meal in one of Fundy's comfortable and scenic picnic areas that are found throughout the park. Washroom facilities are often close-by. Check with our staff to find a location that is just right for you.

Whether by bicycle, foot, or ski...

Our trails provide you with access to Fundy National Park's most amazing places; plunging waterfalls, secluded beaches and breathtaking coastal cliffs await! With over 100 km of trails ranging from short, accessible boardwalks to multi-day adventures, you will find a trail that is just right for you!

Having a great trail experience starts with finding the right match; what do you want to see? Do you want to challenge vourself or to relax? Do you want to travel by bicycle or by foot? Our trail classification system can help you to find a trail that matches your interests. Decide which of the following descriptions best reflects the experience you are looking for and select a trail from the list.

Easy trails

Shorter trails with level terrain. Suitable for most visitors including those with little trail experience.

■ Moderate trails

Medium length trails and moderate elevation gain with some short steep sections. Suitable for visitors who have some basic trail experience and are generally prepared

◆ Difficult trails

Longer trails with long steep sections, rough terrain, and/or river crossings. Suitable for visitors who have trail experience and are prepared; bring a map, a first aid kit, extra clothing, water and food.

Trail tips

Making the most of your trail experience! Pick a trail that best matches your interests, abilities and experience.

- Bring a map, know your trail route and stick to the plan: getting lost is never part of the plan!
- Tell someone your planned route and estimated time of
- Bring extra layers; coastal breezes can be cool even when the forests are warm. Weather can change quickly.
- Bring water and food. Dehydration makes you tired and hunger makes you grumpy — not fun!
- Footwear with good traction and support is best when exploring trails; running shoes or lightweight boots are good choices.
- Leave no trace: please carry out all garbage, yours and any you may find on the trail.
- Be aware that your cell phone carrier might not available in all areas of the park

Drinking Water

Assume all surface water is unfit to drink unless first boiled for 10 minutes or adequately filtered.



Pets

Pets are welcome but must be kept on a leash at all times. Stoop and scoop every time! Pets are not permitted in designated swimming areas.

River Crossings

Several trails in the Park have river crossings. Water levels are monitored and crossings are closed when water levels are high and conditions are most hazardous. At these times, signs are posted at the trailhead to indicate the closure. More information on river crossings is available at the park's Visitor Centre and kiosks. If you are unsure about water conditions or your ability to safely cross, don't take a chance. Crossing the river can be dangerous.

Bicycling

Fundy's landscape offers trails that appeal to bicyclists of every level, from flat and forested trails for family outings to exciting ravines where you can challenge friends. Trails which are used for cycling are shared with hikers so please yield to pedestrians when travelling these trails.



Multi-day hiking experiences

Looking for a more challenging adventure in and around Fundy National Park? Try one of our multi-day hiking experiences!

Trans Canada Trail Sentier NB Trail, Parks Canada and the Trans Canada Trail selected 33 kilometres of existing trails within Fundy National Park and converted it into a section of the Trans Canada Trail. The trails which makeup the Trans Canada Trail in Fundy include Goose River, Shiphaven, Coastal, Upper Salmon River, The Forks and Moosehorn trails. The Trans Canada trails are clearly marked and several interpretive panels along the way inform hikers about the purpose of the Trans Canada Trail system. The trail conveniently connects the Fundy Footpath to the Dobson Trail in New Brunswick, which is also part of the UNESCO Fundy Biosphere Reserve, one of our country's most prized landscapes.

The Fundy Circuit connects 48-kilometres of trails within Fundy National Park to showcase the very best of our river valleys, lakes, coastal forests and beaches.

The Dobson Trail is a continuous footpath through upland wilderness stretching 58 km from the northern boundary of Fundy National Park to Riverview NB (near Moncton).

The Fundy Footpath is a continuous trail that follows the Fundy coastline for 41 km from the western boundary of Fundy National Park to the Big Salmon River near St. Martins, NB.

Hike a "century"

Participate in the The Fundy Challenge! The Fundy Guild rewards those who hike 100 km in Canada's National Parks. There is no time limit for reaching this goal, so day-hikers can participate as easily as avid backpackers. You only have to walk ten kilometres in Fundy; the rest can be completed in any national park.



Tide Schedule

Experience world famous Bay of Fundy Tides in Fundy National Park

In February 2014, the Bay of Fundy was named one of the **Seven Natural Wonders of North America**, because it is home to the largest tidal change in a single day. Officially, the tides of the bay measure 50 feet in height and there are few better places to experience them than in Fundy National Park! Alma Beach, Cannontown Beach, Herring Cove, or Point Wolfe are all great choices to see the tides.





Protecting Fundy

For present and future generations

Evidence of our work can be seen all around us: on land, we are restoring sensitive ecosystems to their natural splendour; in the skies, the once endangered Peregrine falcon has returned to carve up the salty air; and in water, we are bringing back endangered Inner Bay of Fundy Atlantic salmon — the King of Fish — to our two rivers.



Resource Conservation

Inner Bay of Fundy salmon

Wild Atlantic salmon are an iconic Canadian species. Their presence in Fundy National Park is a testament to our pristine wilderness and our commitment to maintaining the ecological integrity of this treasured place. Through salmon, we are able to share stories of our culture and heritage, of our connection to the land, and of the importance of preserving our wild spaces for all generations.

Fundy National Park's salmon story is older than the Park itself. Our salmon are a part of a unique population that is found only in this region: inner Bay of Fundy Atlantic salmon. After years of industrial forestry, commercial fishing, and a changing marine environment, this population experienced significant declines in the 1980's and is currently assessed as 'endangered' under Canada's Species at Risk Act.



Inner Bay of Fundy salmon are too precious to let go. We are working closely with our network of government, non-government, industry, and First Nations partners in new and exciting ways to write the next chapter in the story of this iconic species. Through innovation, collaboration, and dedication, we are bringing back the 'King of Fish' to our rivers.

You can help us to ensure that the inner Bay of Fundy salmon story continues to be told well into the future, by getting involved and lending a hand. This year we launched Fundy National Park's volunteer program, which empowers volunteers young and old contribute to a variety of resource conservation initiatives, including our Atlantic salmon monitoring program. We are also looking for new ways to share our salmon story with you. For the first time, we invite you to participate in our 'swim with salmon for science' program, as a way to experience our recovery efforts for this iconic species first hand.



Why? The brown spruce longhorn beetle is an invasive species in Atlantic Canada and it is having a devastating effect on our forests. The leading cause of their spread is through transport of firewood with invasive insects hidden under the bark. Please leave your wood at home. Firewood can be purchased at the campground for \$6.80 per bundle. Thank you for helping us to protect Fundy's forests.

Keeping the "Wild" in Wildlife

When observing wildlife, respect the following rules:

- Keep your distance.
- Feeding wildlife is strictly forbidden. Animals that are fed will expect handouts and become aggressive towards people.
- Keep your camping and picnic sites clean and store food in the trunk of your car.
- While driving, beware of deer and moose emerging from the forest.
- Be aware that wildlife can be unpredictable.
- More information on wildlife safety is available at the park's Visitor Centre and kiosks.

Collecting plants, animals, etc.

Under the National Parks Act it is illegal to disturb or collect any plants, animals, rocks, shells or artefacts. By complying with this regulation you are helping to preserve Fundy National Park's natural beauty. Thank-you for helping us to preserve Fundy for future generations!

1. St. Andrews Blockhouse National Historic Site

The Blockhouse, built to military specifications during the War of 1812, is situated in the picturesque seaside resort of St. Andrews, in southwestern New Brunswick. Step back in time to an era of conflict along New Brunswick's border with the United States to imagine a period when these neighbours were at war.

2. Carleton Martello Tower National Historic Site

Carleton Martello Tower dates from the War of 1812 and played a pivotal role in conflicts up until the Second World War. The site features a restored powder magazine, a restored barracks room, and exhibits in the tower and in the Visitor Centre. Visitors will also marvel at the spectacular view of the city of Saint John and its harbour.

3. Fundy Trail Parkway

This is the ultimate Bay of Fundy eco-adventure, representing the longest remaining coastal wilderness area between Florida and Labrador. The trails, paths, and stairways lead to pristine beaches and tumbling waterfalls. At the interpretive centre, you'll find original artifacts and old photos from a bygone era. Close by is a suspension footbridge across the sparkling waters of the Big Salmon River. The bridge marks the beginning of the Fundy Footpath: a continuous 41 km (24 mi) wilderness trail from Big Salmon River to the boundaries of Fundy National Park.
