Cultural & Natural History Buff



Backcountry Camping

For those looking to experience Fundy National Park's wilderness, nothing beats a backcountry camping trip. Fundy's backcountry campsites provide pit privies, tent pads and wilderness! Campfires and wood service are available at Chambers Lake, Goose River and Tracy Lake (site 12). Campsites 2, 6, 10 and 12 are group campsites and can accommodate up to 8 adults.

Goose River is located along the Fundy Coast. These campsites are the best place to experience dramatic cliff-top views or camping on a secluded beach.

Foster Book is nestled in a river valley. This site is located next to the cool, clear waters of Point Wolfe River.

Marven-Chambers has quiet lakeside campsites, hidden in the Caledonia Highlands.

Tracey Lake An easy hike from Bennett Lake takes you to Tracey Lake where you can enjoy camping under the stars.

Mid-Country Camping

If you enjoy a camping experience that allows you to escape to the wilderness, but prefer to be able to access services and amenities through the day, mid-country camping is for you: just far enough away to escape, but not far enough to feel disconnected.

Wolfe Lake This small, secluded campground is located at the west end of the park, beside Wolfe Lake. Services are limited to a pit privy, a picnic shelter with a wood stove and firewood, as well as drinking water.

Our rustic cabins can accommodate four adults. They are an easy, affordable and comfortable way to enjoy Fundy. From the vantage point of your private deck, soak in splendid views of the Bay of Fundy and the Acadian forest. The two cabins are located at Hastings Road and Maple Grove Trail within a short distance from the parking lot. Each cabin is equipped with bunk beds, a wood stove, an outdoor fire pit, a picnic table and pit privies. You must bring some essentials such as water, food, sleeping mats and sleeping bags.

Front country Camping

Fundy National Park has three front country campgrounds, each providing a unique camping experience. You will find amenities such as washrooms, showers, electrical, sewer and water hookups all within close proximity to other Park services and facilities. Take a closer look at our front country offer and decide which site is just right for you!

Chignecto North Campground This campground has serviced and unserviced sites with campfire pits. It is a great place for families looking for active, outdoor adventure as it is close to hiking and biking trails, playgrounds, the public program campfire circle and the astronomy viewing site.

Headquarters Campground Headquarters is for those looking for camping made easy! It offers great views of the Bay of Fundy, access to all the services and facilities in the headquarters area including our natural playground. It is within walking distance of the Village of Alma.

Point Wolfe Campground Get just far enough away to escape! This campground provides a simplified frontcountry camping experience with unserviced sites and fire pits; Point Wolfe is in the heart of some of Fundy's most spectacular coastal wilderness.



Four group campsites for tent camping are available to organized groups. Sites can accommodate 20 to 50 people and share a single service building containing washrooms and kitchen shelters. There is one fire pit on each of the four sites. Reservations are required and can be made by calling (506) 887-6000.



Yurts and oTENTiks

Experience Fundy like NEVER before. This vacation, put a new spin on an old family tradition by staying in one of the Fundy National Park yurts or oTENTiks. It's all the marshmallow-y nostalgia of your youth; a perfect blend of comfort and outdoor adventure. Cozy up by the fire, gaze up at the starry night sky, drift off to sleep in a comfortable bed. Your "not-so-traditional hassle-free" vacation.

Yurts These comfortable round abodes can accommodate a family of 5 and are located in the Headquarters Campground. Bring your own bedding and cooking gear.

Alcohol

Alcohol is not permitted in public areas (beaches, picnic areas, trails, etc). Alcohol is allowed on registered campsites only, subject to Provincial and National Park Regulations.

Parks Canada oTENTiks Because sleeping in bunk beds has always been awesome! Designed especially for Parks Canada, the oTENTik is a spacious blend of tent and A-frame cabin equipped with beds and furniture on a raised floor. They are located in the Headquarters and Chignecto Campgrounds. Bring your own bedding and cooking gear.





Golfing

Nestled in the Dickson Brook Valley, Fundy's beautiful 9-hole course was designed by renowned golf course architect Stanley Thompson. Challenge yourself to this par 70 course: fun for novice and experienced golfers alike. Book a tee time at (506) 887-2970 or simply drop in to the Pro Shop, near the first hole. Golf carts are available.

Fishing

Fishing is permitted only in Bennett and Wolfe Lakes (Brook Trout). A National Park fishing permit is required and can be obtained at Bennett Lake or at the Visitor Reception Centre.

Geocaching

Join us for a treasure hunt! The goal of geocaching is to find hidden containers known as *caches* or *geocaches* using a portable satellite navigation device called a Global Positioning System (GPS) receiver. To uncover Fundy's geocaches find the coordinates at **www.geocaching.com.** If you do not own a GPS device, the Fundy Guild rents GPS units at their boutique located at the Visitor Reception Centre.

Picnic in the Park

Enjoy a meal in one of Fundy's comfortable and scenic picnic areas that are found throughout the park. Washroom facilities are often close-by. Check with our staff to find a location that is just right for you.

In Headquarters area, check-out our natural playground and playing fields where you can play, run, jump, or fly a kite in the breezes that blow off the bay! You can also play soccer, tennis or lawnbowling. Tennis and lawn bowling equipment is available at the Golf Pro Shop.

Paddling

The best way to explore the Bay of Fundy is to travel ON the bay! Visit our local kayak guides to see how you can experience the bay first hand! Bennett Lake provides for easy, accessible paddling by canoe, rowboat and kayak, and paddleboard is available for rent on-site.

Red Chairs

Picture this...the view is on us! Fundy National Park recently installed comfortable chairs and benches overlooking the park's most beautiful views. Swimming

Saltwater? Fresh water? Rivers? Lakes? Pool? Ocean? YES! Our solar-heated saltwater pool off the Point Wolfe Road and sandy beach and picnic areas at Bennett Lake are preferred by families. Adventurers can rejuvenate in cool, clear river water after a long hike.

Whether by bicycle, foot, or ski...

Our trails provide you with access to Fundy National Park's most amazing places; plunging waterfalls, secluded beaches and breathtaking coastal cliffs await! With over 100 km of trails ranging from short, accessible boardwalks to multi-day adventures, you will find a trail that is just right for you!

Having a great trail experience starts with finding the right match; what do you want to see? Do you want to challenge yourself or to relax? Do you want to travel by bicycle or by foot? Our trail classification system can help you find a trail that matches your interests. Decide which of the following descriptions best reflects the experience you are looking for and select a trail from the list.



trail experience and are generally prepared

Difficult trails

Longer trails with long steep sections, rough terrain, and/or river crossings. Suitable for visitors who have trail experience and are prepared; bring a map, a first aid kit, extra clothing, water and food.

Trail tips

Making the most of your trail experience! Pick a trail that best matches your interests, abilities and experience.

- Bring a map, know your trail route and stick to the plan: getting lost is never part of the plan!
- Tell someone your planned route and estimated time of
- Bring extra layers: coastal breezes can be cool even when the forests are warm. Weather can change quickly.
- Bring water and food. Dehydration makes you tired and hunger makes you grumpy — not fun!
- Footwear with good traction and support is best when exploring trails; running shoes or lightweight boots are good choices.
- · Leave no trace: please carry out all garbage, yours and any you may find on the trail.
- Be aware that your cell phone carrier might not available in all areas of the park.

Drinking Water

Assume all surface water is unfit to drink unless first boiled for 10 minutes or adequately filtered.



Pets

Pets are welcome but must be kept on a leash at all times. Stoop and scoop every time! Pets are not permitted in designated swimming areas.

River Crossings

Several trails in the park have river crossings. Water levels are monitored and crossings are closed when water levels are high and conditions are most hazardous. At these times, signs are posted at the trailhead to indicate the closure. More information on river crossings is available at the park's Visitor Centre and kiosks. If you are unsure about water conditions or your ability to cross safely, don't take a chance. Crossing the river can be dangerous.

Bicycling

Fundy's landscape offers trails that appeal to bicyclists of every level, from flat and forested trails for family outings to exciting ravines where you can challenge friends. Trails that are used for cycling are shared with hikers so please yield to pedestrians when travelling these trails.



Multi-day hiking experiences

Looking for a more challenging adventure in and around Fundy National Park? Try one of our multi-day hiking experiences!

Trans Canada Trail Sentier NB Trail, Parks Canada and the Trans Canada Trail selected 33 kilometres of existing trails within Fundy National Park and converted it into a section of the Trans Canada Trail. The trails which makeup the Trans Canada Trail in Fundy include Goose River, Shiphaven, Coastal, Upper Salmon River, The Forks and Moosehorn trails. The Trans Canada trails are clearly marked and several interpretive panels along the way inform hikers about the purpose of the Trans Canada Trail system. The trail conveniently connects the Fundy Footpath to the Dobson Trail in New Brunswick, which is also part of the UNESCO Fundy Biosphere Reserve, one of our country's most prized landscape.

The Fundy Circuit connects 48-kilometres of trails to form a loop within Fundy National Park to showcase the very best of our river valleys, lakes, coastal forests and beaches.

The Dobson Trail is a continuous footpath through upland wilderness stretching 58 km from the northern boundary of Fundy National Park to Riverview NB (near Moncton).

The Fundy Footpath is a continuous trail that follows the Fundy coastline for 65 km from the Visitor Reception centre of Fundy National Park to the Big Salmon River near St. Martins, NB.

Hike a "century"

Participate in the The Fundy Challenge! The Fundy Guild rewards those who hike 100 km in Canada's National Parks. There is no time limit for reaching this goal, so day-hikers can participate as easily as avid backpackers. You only have to walk ten kilometres in Fundy; the rest can be completed in any national park.

Tide Schedule Experience the world famous Bay of Fundy Tides in Fundy National Park

In February 2014, the Bay of Fundy was named one of the **Seven Natural Wonders of North America**, because it is home to the largest tidal change in a single day. In Fundy National Park the tides measure between 9 and 12 metres in height depending on the phase of the moon. Alma Beach, Cannontown Beach, Herring Cove, or Point Wolfe are all great choices to see the tides.





Resource Conservation Profile Restoring Sensitive Ecosystems

Evidence of New Brunswick's cultural history in industrial forestry can be seen throughout Fundy National Park, from the remnants of the Point Wolfe and Bennett Lake Dams to the trails visitors enjoy every day! As part of a larger vision for Fundy National Park's trail system, we are creating a more sustainable trail footprint while offering a more connected and diverse trail experience. As part of this vision we will be restoring land for our Acadian Forest ecosystem by reducing the width of some trails that were once used as logging roads, improving links to the Trans-Canada Trail, and identifying existing areas for multi-use trail development.

But the Acadian Forest isn't the only ecosystem benefiting from our new trail vision. Restoration of the Caribou Plain Bog has been ongoing and with the collaboration of the Maritime College of Forest Technology, we are seeing great improvements in this sensitive ecosystem.



Wild Atlantic Salmon are an iconic Canadian species. Their presence in Fundy National Park is a testament to our pristine wilderness and our commitment to maintaining the ecological integrity of this treasured place. Through salmon, we are able to share stories of our culture and heritage, of our connection to the land, and of the importance of preserving our wild spaces for all generations.

Fundy National Park's salmon story is older than the park itself. Our salmon are a part of a unique population that is found only in this region: inner Bay of Fundy Atlantic Salmon, After years of industrial forestry, commercial fishing, and a changing marine environment, this population experienced significant declines in the 1980's and is currently assessed as 'endangered' under Canada's *Species at Risk Act*.

Inner Bay of Fundy Salmon are too precious to let go. We are working closely with our network of government, non-government, industry, and First Nations partners in new and exciting ways to write the next chapter in the story of this iconic species. Through innovation, collaboration, and dedication, we are bringing back the 'King of Fish' to our rivers.

Experience Nature with our Resource Conservation Team

Fundy National Park has a volunteer program, which empowers volunteers young and old to contribute to a variety of resource conservation initiatives.

We are also looking for new ways to share our stories with you. This year, for the first time, we invite you to participate in our Swim with Salmon for Science program, as a way to experience our recovery efforts for inner Bay of Fundy Atlantic Salmon first hand. (This activity requires an additional fee.)

Please don't bring firewood into Fundy National Park

Why? The Brown Spruce Longhorn Beetle is an invasive species in Atlantic Canada and it is having a devastating effect on our forests. The leading cause of their spread is through transport of firewood with invasive insects hidden under the bark. Please leave your wood at home. Firewood can be purchased at the campground for \$6.80 per bundle. Thank you for helping us to protect Fundy's forests.



The Canadian interpretation site is located at Bayside, New Brunswick, near St. Andrews. 2. St. Andrews Blockhouse National Historic Site

The Blockhouse, built to military specifications during the War of 1812, is situated in the picturesque seaside resort of St. Andrews, in southwestern New Brunswick. Step back in time to an era of conflict along New Brunswick's border with the United States to imagine a period when these neighbours were at war. www.parkscanada.gc.ca/blockhausstandrews

3. Carleton Martello Tower National Historic Site

Carleton Martello Tower dates from the War of 1812 and played a pivotal role in conflicts up until the Second World War. The site features a restored powder magazine, a restored barracks room, and exhibits in the tower and in the Visitor Centre. Visitors will also marvel at the spectacular view of the city of Saint John and its harbour.

4. Fundy Trail Parkway

This is the ultimate Bay of Fundy eco-adventure, representing the longest remaining coastal wilderness area between Florida and Labrador. The trails, paths, and stairways lead to pristine beaches and tumbling waterfalls. At the interpretive centre, you'll find original artifacts and old photos from a bygone era. Close by is a suspension footbridge across the sparkling waters of the Big Salmon River. The bridge marks the beginning of the Fundy Footpath: a continuous 41 km (24 mi) wilderness trail from Big Salmon River to the boundaries of Fundy National Park. www.fundytrailparkway.com
