Welcome to Fundy National Park

Your Bay of Fundy adventure starts here!

Welcome to Fundy National Park, a special protected piece of Canada's coastal wilderness. Parks Canada manages sites in the Province of New Brunswick that are, since time immemorial, the traditional territories of the Mi'kmaq, Wolastoqiyik, and Peskotomuhkati peoples.

This year, we are delighted to announce the opening of our newly rebuilt Amphitheatre. This modern outdoor theatre is the ideal venue for enjoying our exciting programs including the 10th annual Rising Tide Festival in late August which plays host to the best musical talent the East Coast has to offer.

After a year of work, the entirely new and ecologically sustainable Goose River Trail is now open. With its stunning views, this trail will quickly be recognized as one of Atlantic Canada's premium coastal hiking and biking experiences. Also, trail lovers of all types will delight in the endless networks of multi-use trails in the Chignecto Recreation Area.

Fundy has a long history of success in endangered species conservation. As a result, biologists counted more adult salmon returning to our rivers in 2018 than have been seen in 29 years. So, while you hike along the beautiful clear rivers, don't forget to look for salmon along the way, you just may see this endangered icon in real life! You should also check out the new wild flower gardens across from the Headquarters Visitor Centre. These "Pollinator Gardens" host native plants that help species-at-risk such as the Yellow-Banded Bumblebee and the Monarch Butterfly. To learn more about these programs or to get involved, continue reading this guide, stop-by our visitor centres and chat with our friendly staff, or look us up and follow us on social media.

As you explore the park this summer, you may also notice some construction activity. We thank you for your patience and cooperation as we complete many exciting improvements to our facilities to further improve your experience. Finally, as announced last year, youth aged 17 and under are able to enter Parks Canada places for free! There is no better time to create lasting memories with the whole family.

We wish you a safe and enjoyable visit!

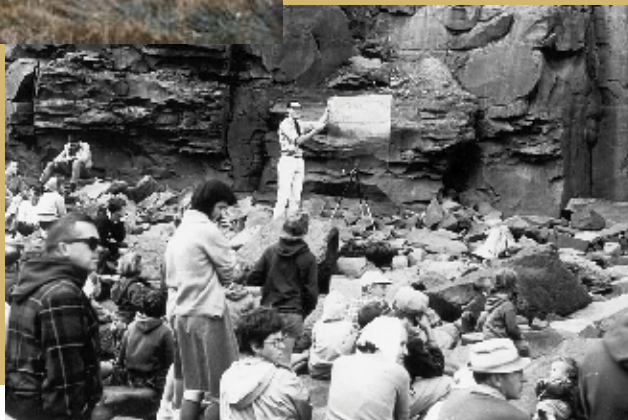

Parks Canada is following the advice of public health experts and taking steps to support Canada's efforts to limit the spread of COVID-19. We are putting in place measures to reduce risks to visitors, employees, and other users of Parks Canada spaces.

Plan ahead

Visiting the Parks Canada website and social media channels to get up to date information about what you can expect during your visit.

Download or print maps and other visitor information ahead of time; purchase the Parks Canada Discovery Pass on line; pack extra hygiene supplies such as hand sanitizer, wipes, toilet paper, and a table cloth; and bring your own water and food.

Call (506) 887-6000 to purchase your Fundy National Park pass.

Visitors are always responsible for their own safety while visiting parks and sites. Search and rescue services may be limited at this time. If you choose to access trails, please obey all signage and closures.

Outdoor Etiquette

Practice physical distancing and hygiene rules during the COVID-19 pandemic while visiting Parks Canada places. Follow public health authorities' guidance for your area, including travel advisories

Plan ahead, prepare, and adjust your plans. Avoid popular destinations and high use

places and times. Also, please be cautious and avoid risky activities. Respect closures and restrictions. Bring, hygiene supplies, water, provisions and equipment as some facilities may be closed. This is a great time to explore natural and cultural treasures close to home.

Avoid touching hard surfaces. Carry disinfectant, wipes, and toilet paper and cover picnic tables.

Let others know of your intention to pass. Signal others using your voice or a bell. Remember to be kind and considerate of others. Yield to oncoming users where space is narrow. Let others move out of bridges, platforms and other narrow spaces before entering.

Pack in and pack out. Keep our places clean, pick up your litter and dispose of it by using appropriate garbage containers or take your waste home.

Step off trails to let others pass where possible. But please try to avoid stepping on vegetation and stay on trails unless letting others pass.

Slow down on trails. Speed increases user conflicts and risks of injuries. Adjust your distance from others based on their speed to maintain physical distancing.

Be respectful of others. Keep prescribed distance while lining up and respect the maximum use capacity in facilities.

Mountain Biking

Fundy's landscape offers trails that appeal to bicyclists of every level, from flat and forested trails for family outings to exciting ravines where you can challenge your friends. Trails that are used for cycling are shared with hikers so please yield to pedestrians when travelling these trails. Don't forget your helmet.

Golfing

Nestled in the Dickson Brook Valley, Fundy's beautiful 9-hole course was designed by renowned golf course architect Stanley Thompson. Challenge yourself to this par 70 course: fun for novice and experienced golfers alike. Book a tee time at (506) 887-2970 or simply drop in at the Pro Shop, near the first hole. Golf carts are available.

Swimming

Dive into our newly renovated, solar-heated saltwater pool. Located off the Point Wolfe Road, the pool now features a wading area and splash zone. Bennett and Wolfe lakes are the ideal spot to cool off on a hot summer day. Remember, swimming in one of the park's rivers can be enjoyable, but can be dangerous if you're not careful.



Fishing

Bennett and Wolfe lakes are open to brook trout fishing. Fly fishing season is open from May 18 to September 15 at Bennett Lake and from June 6 to September 16 at Wolfe Lake, 1 hour before sunrise until 1 hour after sunset. A National Park fishing permit is required and can be obtained from most visitor facilities.

Paddling

Experience the park from a different perspective by paddling the shores of our tranquil lakes or the rugged Bay of Fundy coast. Visit our outfitter or local kayak guides for rentals or guided tours. Bennett and Wolfe lakes are open for paddling (non-motorised boating only).

Beaches

In Fundy National Park the tides measure between 9 and 12 metres in height. Point Wolfe Beach, Alma Beach, and Herring Cove Beach are all great choices to explore and discover the tides in action. Learn more with a park interpreter and join a scheduled guided beach exploration program.

Bird Watching

From rocky shorelines to mixed forests to bogs and meadows, the diverse habitats of Fundy support a large variety of bird life. Grab your binoculars and pick up an official bird checklist at any visitor facility.

Winter wonderland

Fundy National Park is a great spot for a winter snowshoe, ski or even fatbike. Spend the night cozied up in a yurt or oTENTik. For the more adventurous, venture out for a night in a rustic cabin.

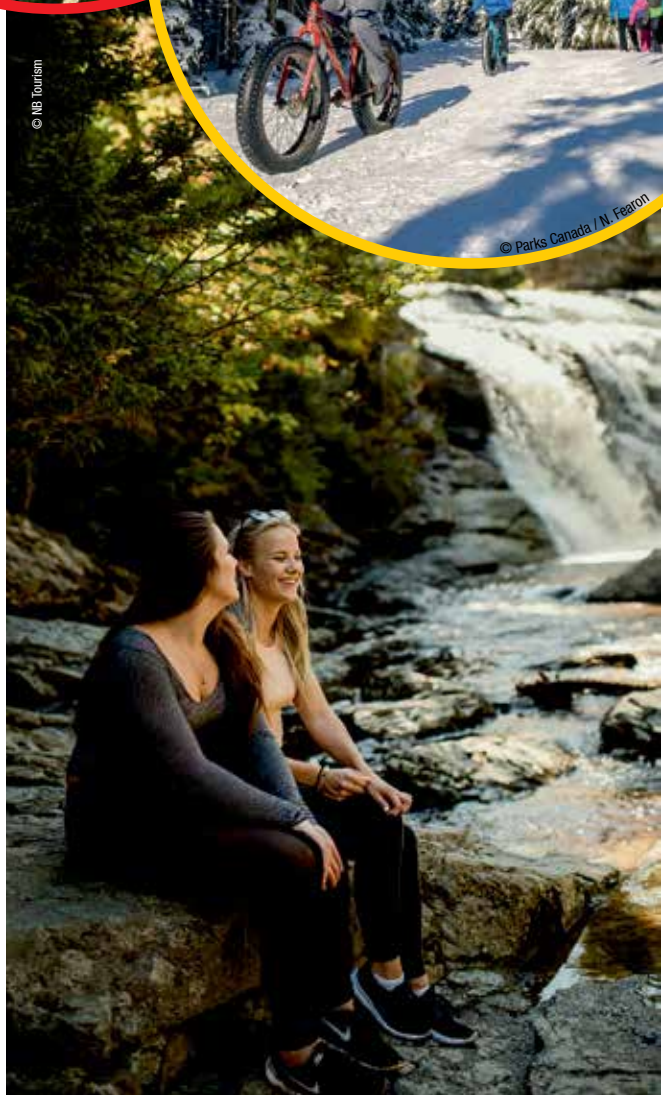
Village of Alma

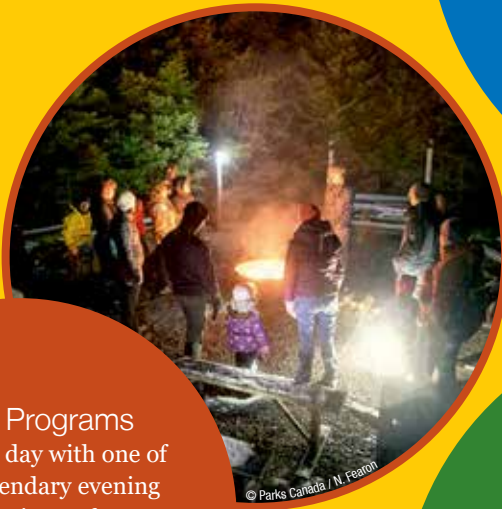
Campfire Programs

Fundy National Park offers countless opportunities to experience and appreciate the natural world. The 2020 International Year of Plant Health celebrates plants and their importance in supporting healthy ecosystems. During your adventures, be sure to check out the newly established pollinator garden, located across from the Headquarters Visitor Centre. The garden is planted with a number of species all naturally from the region, which attracts and helps important pollinators like the Monarch Butterfly and the Yellow-banded bumble bee.

Exhibits

Have a few minutes? Our interpreters are often stationed throughout the park with fascinating Fundy facts and stories to share.

iNaturalist BioBlitz

Discover some of Fundy's most important and fascinating insect species. This program is fun-filled hands-on activity for the whole family! Includes an intro to a great "app" for adding your own observations, wherever your travels may take you.

Dark Sky Discovery

When the sun sets, the sky comes alive! Designated a Dark Sky Preserve, the park is home to some of the darkest skies in Canada. Join our interpreters for a guided tour of the night sky.

Fundy National Park has recently installed a new “Fire Danger Rating” sign at the western entrance of the park. The fire danger level (i.e. Low, Moderate, High, Very High, or Extreme) is based on locally gathered fire weather data. At Fundy National Park, weather data are checked each day and the danger level is updated accordingly. Due to the parks close proximity to the Bay of Fundy, fire danger ratings are often lower than in other parts of the province. Camp fire restrictions may occur at the “Very High” level and visitors can consult park staff or the website for more information.

Trails

Whether by bicycle or on foot, our trails provide you with access to Fundy National Park's most amazing places; plunging waterfalls, secluded beaches and breathtaking coastal cliffs. With over 100 km of trails ranging from short, accessible boardwalks to multi-day adventures, you will find a trail that is just right for you!

Easy

Family-friendly trails that are suitable for all visitors.

Moderate

Medium-length trails with moderate elevation gain and some short, steep sections. Suitable for most visitors.

Difficult

Longer trails with long, steep sections that are suitable for visitors who have trail experience and are prepared.

Trail tips!

Make the most of your experience! Pick a trail that best matches your interests, abilities, and experience.

- Hike with friends. If you are alone, tell someone where you are going and when you'll be back.
- Be careful not to disturb wildlife and their habitats.
- Stay on the trail at all times.
- Check the weather.
- Dress appropriately. Coastal breezes can be cool even when the forests are warm.
- Take along food and water.
- Wear footwear with good traction and support.
- Leave plants and other natural objects for others to enjoy.
- Please carry out all garbage, yours and any you may find on the trail.
- **CAUTION:** Cell phone coverage is not available everywhere in the park.

Multi-day hiking experiences

Looking for a more challenging adventure in and around Fundy National Park? Try one of our multi-day hiking experiences!

The Fund Circuit connects 48-kilometers of trails to form a loop within Fundy National Park. Discover river valleys, lakes, coastal forests and beaches.

The Dobson Trail is a continuous footpath through upland wilderness stretching 58 km from the northern boundary of Fundy National Park to Riverview, near the City of Moncton.

The Fundy Footpath is a continuous trail that follows the Fundy coastline for 41 km from Goose River in Fundy National Park to the Big Salmon River near St. Martins, NB.

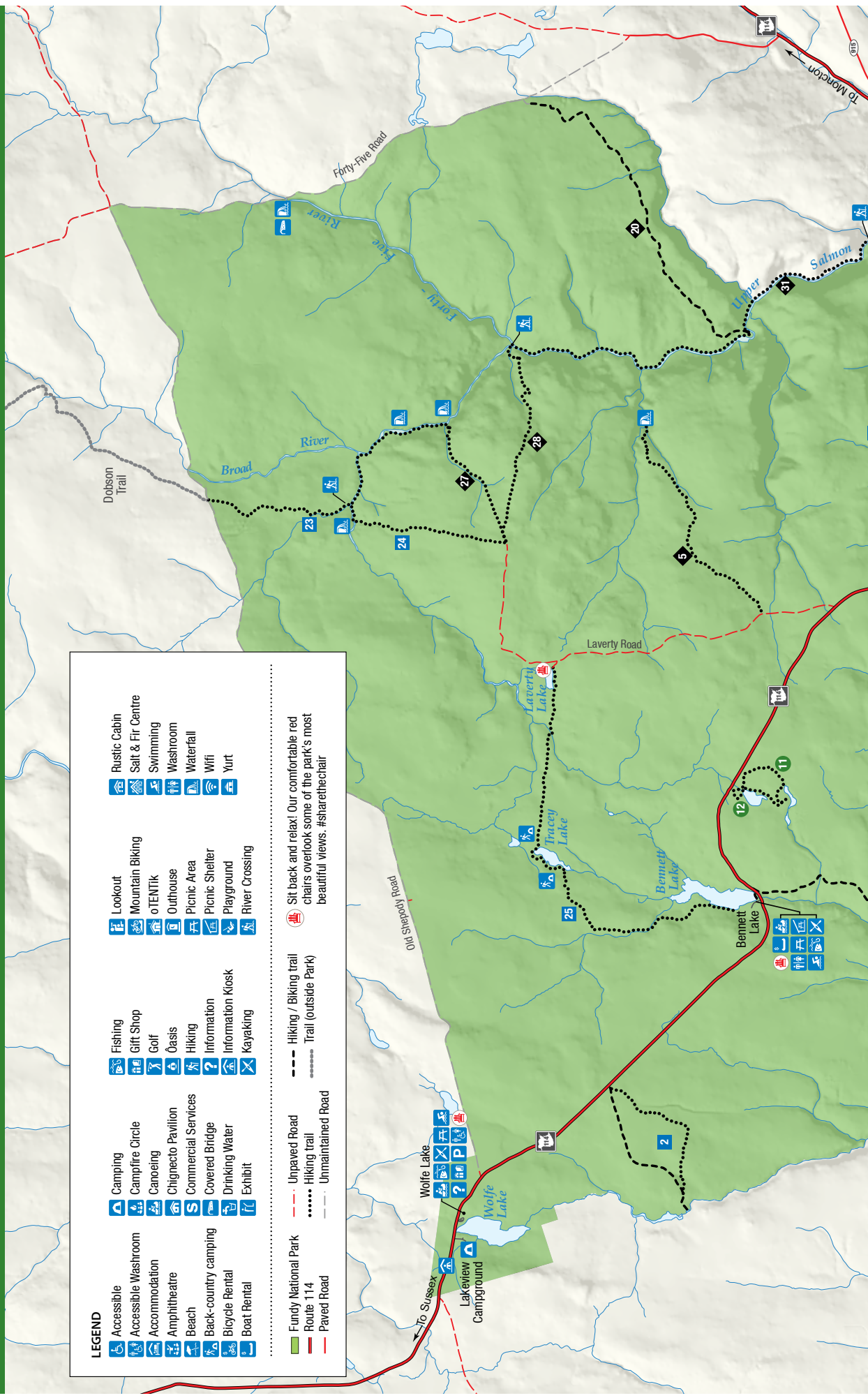

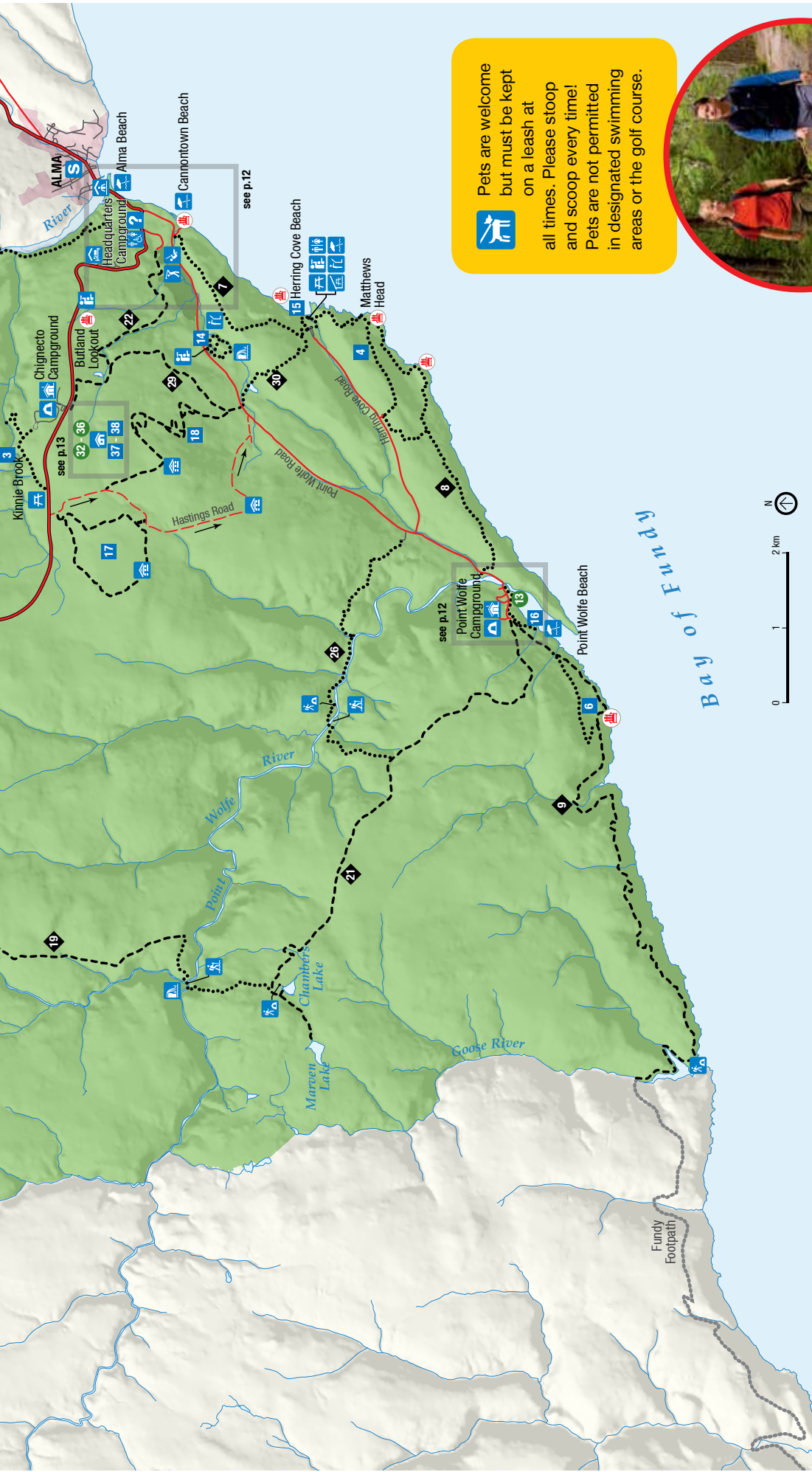

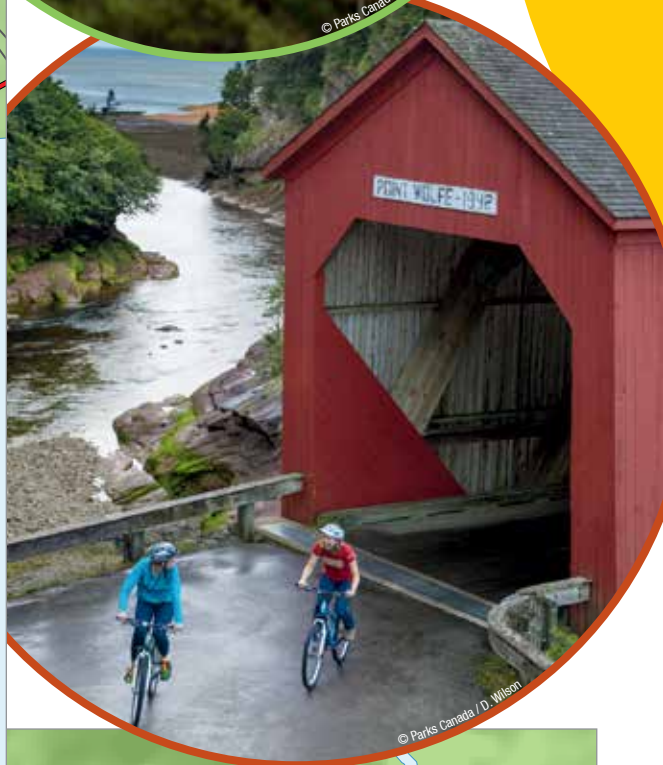


Headquarters Area

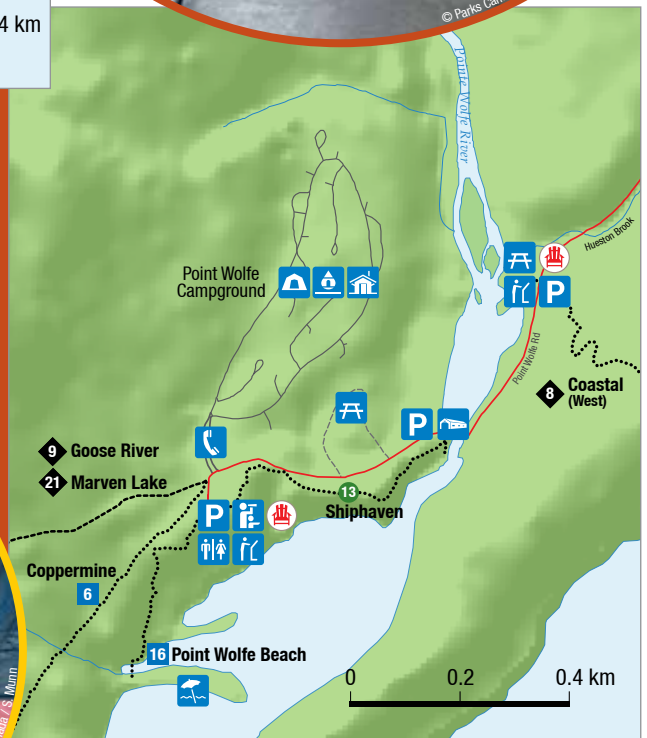

Chignecto Recreation Area

An outdoor adventure hub adjacent to the Chignecto Campground. A variety of family-friendly, short and easy trails for mountain biking and hiking are developed for your enjoyment. The recreation area includes bicycle skill development loop commonly known as Pumptrack, where cyclists ride around different banks and turns. Excellent for learning the basics as well as for training like pros!

The Chignecto Pavilion has washrooms, showers, picnic space, stoves, and parking and is centrally located.

Ecological Integrity Monitoring

Ecological Monitoring is like taking the pulse of the ecosystem. Similar to a regular doctor's check-up, we measure a few key things to determine if the environment is doing well, or if there is a particular condition needing more attention.

- 1 Measuring water quality helps us protect the inner Bay of Fundy Atlantic salmon.
- 2 Recording when frogs start singing in the spring, helps monitor seasonal change.
- 3 Moose populations are studied to help understand forest health.

Recovering the inner Bay of Fundy Atlantic salmon

As part of a recovery team called Fundy Salmon Recovery, Parks Canada is restoring a salmon population which would otherwise be extinct.

- 1 At a young age, wild salmon are captured from their home rivers before they go out to the ocean.
- 2 The salmon are grown for about 18 months at the world's first Wild Salmon Marine Conservation Farm operated by Cooke Aquaculture on Grand Manan Island.
- 3 Mature salmon are released back into Fundy National Park rivers.

at work to ensure the park's ecosystems are thriving. Sometimes this means taking actions to promote or discourage the occurrence of certain species in particular areas. While in the park, if you see a "Restoration Site" please be mindful of the work being done to improve our ecosystems.

Projects currently on the go include: fencing at Bennett Lake to promote vegetation growth, making the site less desirable to Canada geese and reducing human wildlife conflicts, as well as installing coverings over invasive plants in hopes of eradicating them from the park.

You can help! Help us protect our park and the wildlife within it by not feeding the animals. Human food can be harmful as animals that become used to human interaction are more likely to cause conflict.

By staying on trails, you can help reduce the spread of invasive plants, as they can be transported around the park as easily as on the bottom of your boot. These pesky plants are not from around here and can cause harm to our ecosystems. While hiking, let us know if you see any of these plants along your way!

- 1 *Angelica sylvestris* – Woodland angelica
- 2 *Fallopia japonica* – Japanese knotweed
- 3 *Frangula alnus* – Glossy Buckthorn



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Safety First

Your responsibility as a visitor:

We encourage you to enjoy all that the great outdoors has to offer. Take the time to learn about possible hazards that could affect your visit and exercise good judgement.

Campfires

Campfires are only permitted in the fireplaces provided. Do not gather twigs, leaves, or bark from the forest to start your fire. They act as mulch and provide food for plants. Make your own kindling from your firewood which may be purchased at the campground where fires are permitted.

Transportation of firewood is a common way for invasive species to spread. Hidden under the bark non-native, invasive species like brown spruce longhorn beetle are moving across Canada. Fundy National Park is asking visitors to not bring firewood into the park.

River crossings

Several trails in the park have river crossings. Water levels are monitored and crossings are closed when water levels are high and conditions are most hazardous. At these times, signs are posted at the trailhead to indicate any closure. More information on river crossings is available at the park's visitor centres and kiosks. If you are unsure about water conditions or your ability to cross safely, don't take a chance. Crossing the river can be dangerous.

Protect Yourself Against Ticks

Cover up: wear closed-toed shoes, long-sleeved shirts and pants.

Spray: spray feet, ankles and legs with insect repellent.

Self-check: daily self-checks of yourself, your family and your pets can reduce the risk infection. If you find an attached tick, follow the Public Health Agency of Canada's guidelines for prompt removal of the insect.


Swimming is unsupervised in rivers and lakes. For supervised swimming please visit the heated saltwater swimming pool.

All food and garbage must be stored or disposed of in bear-proof containers. In the backcountry, all food and garbage must be packed out.

Forty-Five and Old Shepody roads are not maintained. Using these may damage your vehicle.



Visitor Guidelines

 Leave it for others to enjoy


Take nothing but photos and leave nothing but your footprints. Do not disturb or collect any plants, animals, rocks, shells or artefacts. By complying with this regulation you are helping to preserve Fundy's beauty.


You are not allowed to entice, pet or attempt to pet, harass, or feed wild animals in National Parks.


The use of ATVs, dirt bikes, or other off-road vehicles is not allowed.

Alcohol and Cannabis

Alcoholic beverages and cannabis must be confined to and consumed at your registered campsite. Consumption is not authorized in public spaces such as day use areas, playgrounds, trails and roads, shelters and accommodations.

 **Drones** All Parks Canada places are 'no drone zones' for recreational use. If you do not possess a permit or special permission to fly your drone in a Parks Canada place, please leave your drone at home.

 **Fishing** in a National Park requires a national park fishing permit. Provincial licences do not apply. Fishing for Stripped Bass is not allowed within the limits of Fundy National Park. All rivers and their tributaries within Fundy National Park are closed to fishing. It is your responsibility to understand National Park Fishing Regulations while visiting Fundy National Park.

 **Pets** must be kept on a leash or in suitable confinement. Don't leave your pet unattended. Wildlife, weather, and an unfamiliar environment can be scary or dangerous for your pet. Don't allow your pet to chase any wild animal - it's illegal and dangerous. Pets are not allowed in some areas. Look for notices at trailheads and info centers to find out where these restrictions are. Remember to clean up after your pet.

Emergencies

In the event of a lost person, forest fire, aggressive animal, report illegal activities such as visitor disturbance, poaching, damage to ecosystems, wildlife disturbance etc., call 1-877-852-3100.

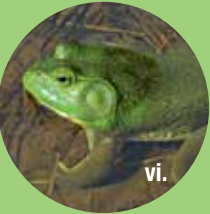
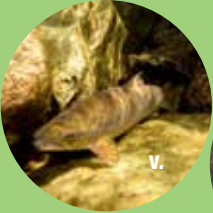
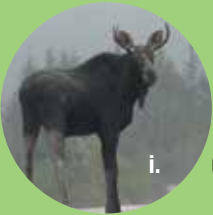

Watching Wildlife

Watching animals in their native habitat can be a memorable part of your visit to a national park. For your safety and theirs, never approach wild animals. Practice patience, silence and treat them with respect. Don't forget to appreciate the little things! Fundy is home to small mammals, birds, frogs and even butterflies. Keep a lookout for these spectacular creatures, too.

Two-hundred eyes are better than two! Check in at one of Fundy National Park's visitor centres to report your wildlife sightings. Don't forget to take pictures and share with us on Facebook (fundyNP) or Twitter @FundyNP) or www.inaturalist.org/projects/fundy-national-park.



i. Moose: Lakes and swamps at dawn or dusk, in particular in the area from Bennett Lake west to Wolfe Lake.

ii. Beaver: Bennett, Laverty, and Wolfe lakes, MacLaren Pond, and Caribou Plain.

iii. Deer: Roadsides, old fields.

iv. Great Blue Heron: Towards the end of summer, Upper Salmon River estuary and along the coast at low tide.

v. Inner Bay of Fundy Atlantic Salmon: Upper Salmon River, September and October.

vi. Bullfrog: Bennett Lake, MacLaren Pond, and Caribou Plain.

1. Canada Jay: A resident of coniferous forests and bogs, the Canada Jay stores large amounts of food for later use. It uses saliva to glue small food items in the nooks and crannies of trees, which allows it to survive our winters.

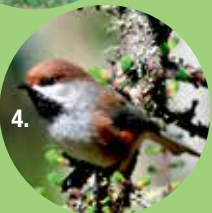
2. Pileated Woodpecker: The size of a crow, the Pileated Woodpecker is the largest woodpecker in Canada.

3. Barred Owl: Inhabitants of mature hardwood and mixed forests has dark eyes, unlike other large owls in our forests.

4. Boreal chickadee: A rarer sight! It prefers coniferous woods. In winter, it is at times seen in mixed groupings of nuthatches, kinglets and chickadees.

5. Ruffed grouse: The Ruffed Grouse beats its wings on its chest as a display to attract females.

6. The Canada warbler: The Canada Warbler, a species at risk, is one of over 20 species of wood warblers that breed in the park.

a. American Emerald Dragonfly: One of the earliest dragonflies to emerge in the spring, found throughout the park near water from late May to late August.

b. Striped Sedge Grasshopper: Denizens of the bog, including Fundy's Caribou Plain, and the females are quite RED!

c. Three-banded Lady Beetle: Perhaps our most common native species of Lady Beetle.

d. Orange-legged Drone Fly: Is it a Bee? No, it's a Fly! Flower flies are often mistaken for bees or wasps, because many are such great mimics.

e. Bald-faced Hornet Fly: Is this a wasp? No, it's a fly! A wasp mimic and like most flower flies, an important pollinator.

f. Red Admiral Butterfly: One of the more than 50 kinds of butterfly that call Fundy home. Like the Monarch, it also migrates in from the south.
