FUNDY NATIONAL PARK INTERPRETIVE PROGRAM

The National Parks Service of Canada presents this nature program to help further your enjoyment and understanding of the features of Fundy National Park. The Park Naturalists conducting the program are available to answer your questions. They may be contacted at their office in the Assembly Hall or through the Information Office at Park Headquarters.

NATURE WALKS AND HIKES

Guided by trained naturalists. Bring the family to see interesting features of the Park. (See daily schedule on back page. Shoes suitable for walking on woodland trails should be worn on all hikes. Small children must be accompanied by adults).

- 1. CARIBOU PLAIN (2½ mi.) Trip past beaver dams and small lakes, through softwood and hardwood forests, to an open bog, the Caribou Plain. No steep slopes. Advisable to be prepared for some wet ground during rainy weather.
- 2. ALMA BEACH (1 mi.) A beach walk to examine transitions from land and freshwater communities to marine communities along tidal flats.
- 4. HERRING COVE BEACH (1 mi.) A trip on the beach to see the effects of Fundy's great tides on the shoreline and marine life of the area.
- 5. KINNIE BROOK (2½ mi.) A fairly strenuous hike on which an easy return trail may be taken to avoid the steep valley slopes. This hike examines the role of animals in the forest, varied plant life and an underground stream.

- 6. BACK FORTY (1½ mi.) A pleasant walk to a lovely maple grove to examine the forest succession from abandoned farmland to hardwood forest
- 7. PT. WOLFE BEACH (1 mi.) Meet at the Coppermine Trail for a walk to the beach to examine the geology, marine life, and tides at the mouth of the Pt. Wolfe River.

EVENING PROGRAMS

You are invited to attend illustrated talks about the natural history of the park, presented at dusk in the Amphitheatre, Park Headquarters. In wet weather these are held in the Assembly Hall.

SELF-GUIDING NATURE TRAILS

Five self-guiding trails, supplied with guide leaflets and signs and marked by yellow triangles, permit you to discover the natural history of representative areas of the park. These trails are the Caribou Plain (bog), Dickson Falls (spruce-fir forest), Maple Grove (hardwood forest), and Coppermine (geology).

CHILDREN'S PROGRAM

Ask at campground or information offices for a special brochure about our children's program, conducted during July and August, and at other times by special arrangement.

PROTECT YOUR VALUABLES

Lock them in the trunk or glove compartment of your parked car.

BAD WEATHER

In bad weather, evening programs are held in the Assembly Hall, Park Headquarters.

In cases of cancellation due to rain, guided walks scheduled for 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. will be replaced by a program held in the Assembly Hall at 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. respectively. Cancelled hikes scheduled at other times or on Sunday morning will not be replaced.

What the programs are all about

The interpretive programs seek to show you the subtle yet vital relationships that exist between a park's various elements. Land, water, plants and animals all give and take from each other in a life cycle that forms the total environment.

To protect your national parks and ensure their continued existence, please leave everything undisturbed: don't feed animals, don't pick flowers, don't scratch your name on rocks, learn and obey fire regulations, and please, don't litter. There are garbage receptacles throughout the parks, and lightweight bags are available free from park staff so hikers and backwood campers may pack out their refuse.
