Our Heritage to Share

The Halifax Citadel endures as a gateway to Canada's colonial heritage and passage to nationhood. Once the command post and landward bastion of Halifax's defences, the Citadel stands

watch as it has done since the city was the principal British naval station in North America.

Since Halifax's founding, in 1749, Citadel Hill has served as the site of four different forts. Each was built during a time of perceived threat. The Citadel you see today was the last to be built, and took over 28 years to complete. This Citadel, finished in 1856, was intended to deter an overland assault on the city in the event of war with the United States.

The British garrison of Halifax was ultimately withdrawn in 1906 in response to growing tensions in Europe, leading up to the First World War. The Citadel continued to serve an important

role with the Canadian military. During two World Wars the Citadel served as a sentinel on the home front and a symbol for those departing for overseas. Such was the strength of the Citadel and harbour defences that no enemy ever dared attack.

In 1951 the Citadel was declared a National Historic Site, signalling the end of its proud military career. Today its restored walls welcome all who wish to experience our rich and diverse shared heritage.


While in the area, we suggest you visit nearby Prince of Wales Tower and York Redoubt National Historic Sites. Our staff would be pleased to give you directions to these sites.

New Special Programs

Our latest programs feature a new experiential visit for school groups. The school program was designed for the Nova Scotian Grade 6 curriculum, and allows participants to discover the dramatic and exciting changes occurring in the classrooms of Victorian Halifax.

Another unique experience, offered year round, are the piping and drumming programs. Participants can learn the art of playing the great highland pipes or the snare drum. For Your Safety: The Halifax Citadel is a 19th-century fortification with steep masonry walls surrounded by a ditch up to nine metres deep. To have a safe visit, please observe the following: **Do not climb** onto the earthen walls or out

into the gun openings, which slope directly into the ditch and are especially slippery and dangerous when wet. Young children should be under close supervision at all times. **Watch out for** low doorways and uneven steps and floors.

Making the Most of Your Visit

Starting Your Visit Plan to spend one to three hours exploring the site. We recommend you begin your visit at the information centre. Our staff in the centre would be happy to help you plan an exciting and enjoyable visit.

Safety We want your stay with us to be a safe one. Please remember not to climb to the highest level of the earthen walls or into the gun openings.

Noon Gun Each day, save for Christmas Day, noon time in Halifax is marked by the firing of the Noon Gun, a local tradition for the last 142 years. Dressed as the Royal Artillery of 1869, our Living History unit performs drills taken from British Army manuals of the period.

Tours Guided tours start at the information centre regularly throughout the day. Tours are 45 to 60 minutes in length and cover many aspects of the site's history. Our knowledgeable guides will be happy to answer questions on all aspects of the fort's history.

A Living History The Citadel is brought to life by two historic regiments of the British army, soldiers' wives, civilian labourers and even some children. During our peak season, you may see 78th Highlanders parading or standing guard, their wives doing the laundry, pipers and drummers playing, Artillerymen working the great guns and labourers maintaining the works.

For visits of all lengths Take in the panoramic view offered from the viewing platforms. Tour the new Fortress Halifax, Warden of the North exhibit 1 to really understand the story of the Halifax Defences. Do not forget to pick up a souvenir or a gift for someone at home from the Regimental Shop.

For a visit of less than one hour The Citadels Exhibit 3 has spectacular models of the fortifications that have been on Citadel Hill; these will show you the full scope of the Citadel. We have several restored rooms that are pockets of the 19th century recreated throughout the Citadel. These rooms will give you a sense of the soldiers' lives.

For a visit of one to two hours Take in a guided tour or view the *Tides of History* 12 to get the story of the Citadel. Explore the ditch, ramparts and parade to see the whole fort. You will also have enough time to see many of our exhibits.

For a visit longer than 1.5 hours Be sure to catch both the *Tides of History* 12 and a guided tour. Complete your stay by visiting the *Fortress Halifax*, *Warden of the North* exhibit 1 and the Army Museum 11. All of our exhibits add to the story of the Citadel and the people who worked and lived here.

Remembering your visit Take home the sights and sounds of your day at the Citadel by stopping into the Regimental Gift Shop. We offer videocassette versions of the *Tides of History* and our new musical CD, *The Pipes and Drums of the 78th Highlanders*. Now you can share your visit with friends and family at home.
