


Visitor Guide






Events







Maligne Canyon Safety

If you are planning to venture onto the frozen bottom of the canyon, we highly recommend you travel with a certified guide. Guides will outfit you with a helmet and ice cleats. They are familiar with hazards and know the safest route.

HAZARDS IN THE CANYON:

- Surfaces are slippery and uneven;
- Thin ice and/or breakable shelf ice may give way unexpectedly;
- Below the ice, the river is cold, deep and fast-moving;
- Frequent rock and ice fall;
- There are limited ways to exit the canyon, making escape difficult;
- Cell phone coverage in the canyon is not reliable.



Icefields Parkway linking Jasper and Banff National Parks

The Icefields Parkway is one of the world's most scenic drives. Just beyond the Columbia Icefield is the Banff National Park boundary. Here are a few highlights:



3 Athabasca Glacier 103 km south of Jasper Be awestruck by the Athabasca Glacier and admire the Stutfield and Dome glaciers from the Icefields Parkway.



5 Weeping Wall | 124 km south of Jasper The Weeping Wall tumbles more than 100 metres (330 feet) in a series of waterfalls whose main fall is called *Teardrop*. The sight is impressive in the winter and is a popular ice climbing destination.



6 Bow Lake Viewpoint 193 km south of Jasper One of the most scenic lakes along the Parkway and the source of the Bow River.




7 Crowfoot Glacier 197 km south of Jasper Enjoy this rewarding view from the roadside pull-off. When this glacier was named a century ago, it looked like a three-toed crow's foot. Since then, one toe has melted, and the middle toe is slowly disappearing.

Characteristics

Resembles a large domestic cat. Short tail long legs, large feet and prominent ear tufts.

Habitat

Higher elevations.

Characteristics

Built like a large German shepherd, with longer legs. Colour can vary from white to black.

Habitat

Throughout the park but particularly in valley bottoms.



Characteristics

White rump, short light brown fur; males: thick curved horns, females: narrow horns.

Habitat

Near steep rocky terrain.







Coyote

Characteristics

Brown body, darker neck and large tan rump patch, backwards slanting antlers.

Habitat

Valley bottoms.

Characteristics

Resembles a mediumsized dog, thick, bushy tail, greyish-brown in colour, long and narrow muzzle.

Habitat

Valley bottoms.

Characteristics

Narrow black horns carried by both sexes, beard, long white hair.

Habitat

Steep rocky terrain.





Driving on the Icefields Parkway

- Road reports are based on the worst condition that a driver may encounter over the road's entire 232-kilometre length. As in any mountain environment, weather can change very quickly, often changing the road conditions.
- Ensure your car has snow tires—look for the snowflake symbol. Snow tires are mandatory from November 1 to March 31 on the Parkway.
- Plan to start early and complete your drive (with time for exploration and stops along the way) during daylight hours.

- Fill your gas tank and bring extra windshield washer fluid. There are no services along the Icefields Parkway in winter.
- There is no cell phone reception from Athabasca Falls to Lake Louise.
- The Parkway is not salted so it is often covered in ice and snow.
- The Parkway occasionally closes in winter and spring due to increased avalanche danger or to clean up snow and debris on the highway.

- · Do not approach wildlife.
- Do not feed wildlife.
- Do not litter.





Give Wildlife Space.

- Stay in your vehicle.
- Slow down. Obey speed limits.
- Pull over where it is safe to do so. Do not stop in driving lanes.
- Move on if a traffic jam develops.



Seasonal Closure for Caribou Conservation

Jasper National Park is home to four distinct herds of woodland caribou. Parks Canada is taking action to protect this species at risk by closing backcountry areas to help reduce wolves access to caribou habitat via human packed trails.

As of **November 1**, backcountry areas of the Tonquin, Maligne- Brazeau, and North Boundary ranges of Jasper National Park are closed to protect important caribou habitat. For more information regarding seasonal closures, visit: parkscanada.gc.ca/caribou-winter-access

Reduced speed limit on the Icefields Parkway

From south of Sunwapta Falls through to Beauty Creek Hostel, a reduced speed zone of 70 km/h is in effect from February 1 – June 1. Drive with care; this is a time when caribou may be seen crossing the road.

You are in Avalanche Country

Whenever there is snow on a slope, there is potential for an avalanche. Skiers, snowshoers, fat bikers and hikers must be familiar with avalanche terrain and avalanche conditions to safely enjoy the mountains. For more information, visit: parksmountainsafety.ca

Ice Safety

Waterfalls, Canyon, Rivers (moving water):

Travelling on ice covered moving water is unsafe. Doing so without a certified guide is not recommended. Respect all safety signage and fenced areas.

Ponds, Lakes

The Red Cross recommends an ice thickness of at least 15 centimetres for safe skating. Parks Canada does not monitor ice thickness. It is up to you to assess the thickness of the ice. This does not apply to moving waters.



Hazardous Trees

Heads-up, trees may fall on trails at any time, especially when it is windy.



Do's and Don'ts on Groomed Ski Trails

- Do not snowshoe or walk on groomed ski tracks.
- Skiers going downhill have the right-of-way.
- Keep to the right when meeting oncoming skiers.
- When resting, move off the trail.
- When passing say "track please" and pass on the left side.


Featured Regulations



Keep dogs on leash at all times (and pick up after them).



Jasper is a no drone zone. Report all drone use sightings to Jasper Dispatch 780-852-6155.



Daily fire permits cost \$8.80 extra. Camping permitted in designated campgrounds only.

You must contact the information centre to get a permit (780-852-6177 ext 2).

Jasper campgrounds operate on a self-registration system in winter. Campsites in these campgrounds are available on a first-come first-serve basis. Check-out time is 11:00 a.m. Payment must be made with cash or credit card at the site. Debit cards are NOT accepted.

Overnight bivy camping is permitted at Wilcox campground for mountaineers who need an early start for certain routes around the Columbia Icefield. No RV's or trailers allowed.


