



Help us protect this habitat

As you hike the Samuel trail, you will see a **salt marsh**. This kind of **habitat** is somewhat exceptional on the north shore of the Gulf.

Salt marshes are one of the most productive habitats on land. Their most vital component is vegetation. Plants filter pollutants in the water, and provide food and shelter to a multitude of animal species, including fish, crustaceans and birds.

Even if it appears shorter to cross through the marsh, take the bypass path as it is better for the ecosystem and for your shoes!

- Use the **designated trails** and stay in the **vegetation-free zone** when walking on the seashore.
- Avoid disturbing wildlife and be sure to leave natural objects such as rocks, plants, and fossils where you found them.
- **Be attentive** and **keep your distance** from seabirds and shorebirds; they are particularly vulnerable to disturbance.

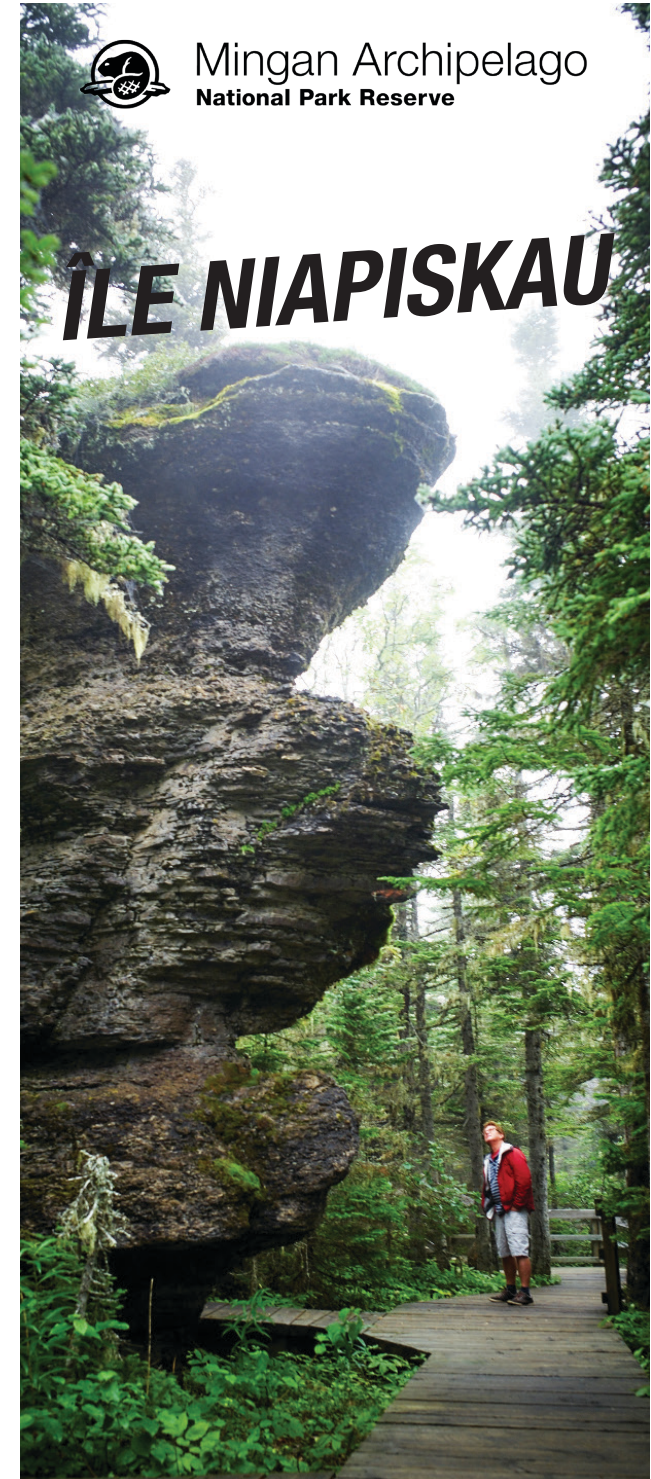

Did you know that...

- The island has an innu name, which means **the waiting-for-ducks island**. It used to be called *île à Samuel* in honour of Samuel Doyle, who cut his hay there. People also cut wood, grazed animals and picked wild berries on the island.
- The island is home to a famous monolith called **Madame de Niapiska** by Roland Jomphe, a poet from Havre-Saint-Pierre..
- Variations in the sea level caused by the retreat of the great glaciers about 10,000 years ago coupled with repeated action of **waves, wind, freezing** and **thawing** have created these huge rock sculptures.
- The limestone contains an abundance and diversity of **fossils** that tell us about the island life over **450 million years** ago.

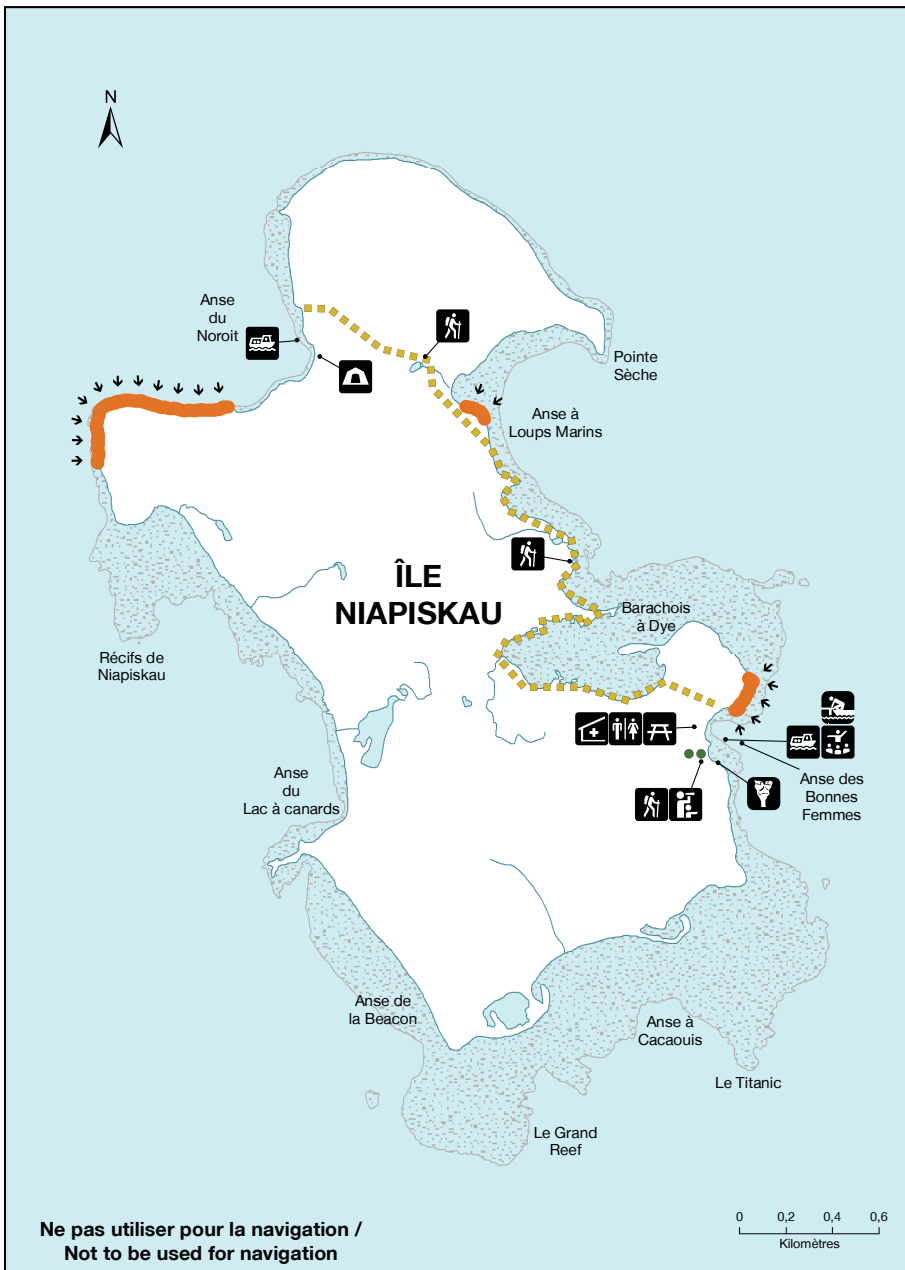

For your safety

Danger of falling rocks near the cliffs. Keep at a safe distance, do not stop and avoid walking under overhanging rocks.

At low tide, water and seaweed on the rocks create slippery conditions. Please proceed with caution.

Climbing on the monoliths is dangerous and prohibited.

Cell phone coverage is limited. Make sure to possess an adequate communication device.

Checklist

Allow **1 1/2 to 2 hours** to complete the *Samuel Trail*. Hiking boots are recommended, as there are some wet and muddy areas.

To ensure a pleasant visit, don't forget :

- Water
- Snacks

- Binoculars and a camera
- Garbage bags (to pack out your garbage)
