


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Welcome

Two years ago, we received special funding for a Species At Risk program. Staff and partners are working together to develop recovery strategies for species at risk populations and to ensure their continued existence in the national park and local area.

"The Nemos of Point Pelee" A Fish Population Study



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Researchers have determined the make-up of the marsh's fish population and how we can help to ensure their survival. Results indicate that there are 33 species of fish in the marsh including four species at risk.

"The Golden Blooms of June" Eastern Prickly Pear Cactus

Since this cactus is a species at risk and the patches in the park have been declining over the last few decades, studies are underway to assist in developing recovery actions.



"Where have all the turtles gone?" **Turtle Predation Monitoring**



The boxes you may have seen by the park roadsides are part of a monitoring program to study turtle populations and learn more about their predators.

The Southern Flying Squirrel "A happy ending!"

After relocating 99 squirrels to the park more than 10 years ago, we are happy to report that the project is a success, with a population now around 700 and growing!



These nocturnal mammals disappeared many years ago due, in part, to loss of habitat and predation by feral cats. Today, the Southern Flying Squirrel can, once again, call the park their home!

Amphibians and Reptiles "Give 'em a Brake"



During spring and fall, Spring Peeper frogs, turtles and snakes cross the park road to access feeding and breeding habitats. Hundreds are killed each year. Please drive carefully.



Explore the Park Trails

1 Marsh Boardwalk 1.4 km (loop) Both floating and stationary boardwalk including two observation areas with telescopes. Habitats: open ponds and cattail marsh.



(2) Centennial Bike Trail 4 km (one way) Runs parallel to park road from Marsh Boardwalk south to the Visitor Centre. Gentle, tree lined, winding trail. Stop at picnic sites along the way: Also used by


Habitats: hackberry dry forest and beach.



3 DeLaurier Trail 1.2 km (loop) Historic house and barn with exhibits and artifacts featuring the park's cultural and human heritage. One observation platform. Habitats: open fields, cedar savannah, swamp forest, marsh, and old canals once used by farmers.

4 Tilden's Woods Trail 1 km (loop) Begins at northeast corner of Visitor Centre Habitats: horsetails and mature swamp forest, cedar savannah.

5 Shuster Trail 0.5 km (one way) Begins along Tilden's and keeps going straight to east beach (no visitor facilities).



(6) Chinquapin Oak Trail 1 km (one way) Access to historic cemetery. Access from Tilden's Woods Trail or near White Pine picnic area. Habitats: mixed dry forest, restored roadway.

Woodland Nature Trail 2.75 km (loop) Begins behind Visitor Centre. Partially boardwalked wetland and mature forests. Interpretive trail guides available. Habitat: swamp and dry Carolinian forest and cedar savannah.

8 Botham Tree Trail 0.5 km (loop) Begins at Visitor Centre. Trail guides available. Identifies trees unique to the Carolinian forest.

9 Tip Trail 0.4 km (one way)

Access to the most southern point of mainland Canada; sandspit reaches out into Lake Erie. Length and shape of sandspit varies according to water levels and currents. Shuttle from Visitor Centre drops you off at trail head from April to October. Exhibits and telescope. Habitats: early successional woodlands and beach.

There are no lifeguards at Point Pelee National Park. Do not swim at beaches during times of rough water. Please supervise children closely. Emergency life saving equipment is available at Northwest Beach, Black Willow Beach and West




Park Administration and General Works Facilities are located 4 km north of the national park.

Visitor Code

- Park roads are used by people and wildlife. Obey the speed limit and park only in designated areas.
- Bicycles are restricted to the bike trail and roadways.
- Feeding wildlife and fish is prohibited.
- Pets must be under physical control and on a leash, max 3 m (9ft). Remember to stoop and scoop!
- Prevent the spread of insect pests, do not bring wood
- into the park. Use charcoal in stoves and barbeques. · Collecting natural objects is prohibited.
- · Stay on designated trails to avoid poison ivy and ticks. Do not enter closed areas.

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- Alcohol is prohibited in the park.
- · Beach water quality is monitored weekly. Poor water quality results will be posted at the park entrance.
- · Avoid stable flies by wearing light coloured clothing and staying in windy areas.
- · Fireworks and firearms, including bows and arrows, are prohibited.



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
