Riding Mountain National Park

- Established by Order-in-Council in 1929, and officially opened in 1933.
- Covers almost 3,000 square kilometres.
- Protects ecosystems representative of the Southern Boreal Plains and Plateaux Natural Region of Canada.
- Representative example of the Manitoba Escarpment which rises 457 metres from the surrounding lands.
- One of the last remnants of woodland existing in the heartland of North America.
- Part of the traditional territory of the Anishnabe people with 7 First Nation communities in the Treaty 2 Area and RMNP region.
- Partner in the Riding Mountain Biosphere Reserve to harmonize areas of human use and environmental protection.
- Major tourism destination and recreational resource for the Province of Manitoba, including the heritage Community of Wasagaming.
- Provides protected habitat for elk, moose, wolf, black bear and other species.

Riding Mountain East Gate Registration Complex National Historic Site

- Built in 1933-1934, designated as a National Historic Site in 1992 and commemorated in 1995.
- A nationally significant example of the Rustic Design Tradition of the 1930s in Canada's National Parks.
- Consisting of a registration building and two staff cabins, the site was constructed of indigenous materials by skilled local craftsmen hired through the Federal Government's Depression Relief Program.
- An enduring landmark that is symbolic of early auto-tourism and outdoor recreation.

Family of Protected Heritage Areas

These are part of a Canada-wide family of special places, including:

- 46 national parks;
- 171 national historic sites;
- 4 national marine conservation areas
- 1 Urban Park, 1 Canadian Landmark, 1 International Historic Site.
