



SALMON CODE



USE 40UR SENSES




SOUND MAP

It's dark underwater and Joy can't really see her food. So she sends out clicks and listens for them to echo back from salmon. Finding something by sound is called echolocation. At Gulf Islands National Park Reserve. listen for the "puuush" of breath from a Killer Whale's blowhole.



GO PLAY

ECHO-ECHOLOCATION

Gather three players: a whale, a salmon and a boat. The blindfolded Killer Whale stands still and shouts, "Salmon, where are you?" The Chinook Salmon swims around, replying quietly, "Here I am." The boat putts about. The whale points at the salmon to catch it.

Can the whale find food with the noisy motor boat close by? How about far away? After trying both ways, switch places.






GO INVESTIGATE P

PEAS IN A POD

Joy will swim with her L-pod family her whole life. You can call her L-119. That's because she's the 119th Killer Whale born into L-pod since we started keeping track. Watch for Joy and her family when you're on a BC ferry.

Give each member of your family a Killer Whale pod name and number. The first letter of your last name is your pod. The oldest person is 1. The second-oldest is 2 and so on.



TRY IT OUT !!

MANY NAMES

The love you have for your family makes you care for them. Now imagine feeling the same way about animals. This area's First Nations people see Killer Whales as part of their family. They also have many names for Killer Whales.



Try saying them out loud.

- Nuu-chah-nulth Peoples kakawin
- (Say: ka-ka-win)
 - Hul'q'umin'num' Peoples Q'ul-lhanumutsun
- B (Say: Q-ul-lhah-nu-mut-cun)

WSÁNEĆ Peoples - KEL,ŁOLEMEĆEN

- (Say: Qul-thawl-ah-much-en)
 - Songhees and Esquimalt Peoples qəllaləməčən
- (Say: q deep in your throat, + like 'tl' in bottle, 9 in the middle of your mouth and č - like 'ch' in chin.)

Psst: Joy's family catches salmon and shares with each other so everyone gets to eat.

Pick up beach trash.




Share what you learned.

Use a refillable water bottle.









